




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


UILT IN 1966, THE LITTLE
ROCK HOME APRIL AND DAVID
MESSERSMITH SHARE WITH THEIR
THREE CHILDREN WAS REMODELED
WHEN THE FAMILY MOVED IN 13
YEARS AGO. However, both their
style and needs have evolved over the
past decade, prompting them to call local
designer Krista Lewis to update several spaces in the
home, including the kitchen. "Krista and I were sorority
sisters at the University of Arkansas, so it was a lot of
fun to get to work with a friend on this project," April
says. The two shared a common goal of renovating the
room while keeping the style in line with the home's
midcentury architecture.

The footprint of the kitchen didn't change in the

makeover. However, several tweaks to the existing cabinetry, which also received new front panels, helped make it more user friendly: A set of cabinets were removed to allow for a larger four-door refrigerator; a desk was replaced with cabinetry and new countertops to create a buffet; cabinetry was extended to the ceiling to create storage for less frequently used items; and several base cabinets were swapped for drawers to create easy access to heavy pots and pans.

In terms of the palette, light and bright was the goal. Krista chose white walls and warm gray accents to play off of the hardwood flooring, which was one of the only carryovers from the previous design. These neutrals are accented with a vivid green, seen most prominently on the breakfast table chairs. "One pop of color keeps this room very clean and streamlined," Krista says.

CLEAN CUT

Engineered quartz covers the counters and backsplash.

"Using the same material and taking it up the wall for the backsplash gives one seamless appearance, which also helps the space feel larger," Krista says.

WELL-ROUNDED

The globe pendant over the sink provides extra light for washing dishes. Its cast stone material is echoed on the chandelier seen over the table as well as on the tabletop surface.

CLOSE AT HAND

In addition to several other changes to the cabinetry, the upper cabinets to the left of the sink were swapped for open shelving with industrial-style brackets. "I keep all of the smaller dishes we use every day here so they're easy to reach," April says.

GOING GREEN

"Even before COVID-19, we ate most meals at home, so we wanted a big table to accommodate the five of us," April says. Indoor/outdoor velvet covers the seats making for easy cleanup.
